rement in the care of Lucy Crawford (deceased) was as follows: 145 hours - Report - told by S/N McDowell of Lucy Crawford's lmission. 2020 hours approximately. I went to treatment room. Inside as S/N M Burns, Dr Malik, Mr and Mrs Crawford and Lucy. I troduced myself to the parents and S/N Burns left. Dr Malik found a nall vein in Lucy's left foot and inserted a venflon. He obtained a blood imple and flushed the venflon with Hespal at this time the venflon tissued was then removed as it was not acceptable for Intravenous fluids access remained in the treatment room with Mrs Crawford and Lucy as Dr lalik went to phone Dr O'Donohoe and asked him to come to the ward. ucy was given orange juice in a cup, approx 50mls. Lucy passed urine imen bag and a sample was tested by myself which had protein ad ketones. The rest of the urine was placed into a white top container ad was left ready to be sent to the Lab. I done Lucy's temperature and it as still high so I gave her per rectum paracetamol 120mgs in the presence f her mother. Dr O'Donohoe came to the ward - he requested Elma ceam be applied to both of Lucy's hands which I did. While he waited for ie cream to work I made up a drink of dioralyte and gave Lucy 100mls hich she drank. She asked for her dummy which her mother got her. Dr l'Donohoe then inserted a venflon into Lucy's hand and flushed it with lespal. I connected the Intravenous line and I was instructed by Dr Donohoe to run the fluids at 100mls per hour until Lucy has passed

urine. In the presence of Dr O'Donohoe, Dr Malik, myself, Mrs Crawford and Lucy I connected the line to the drip counter and took Lucy and Mrs Crawford to cubicle 6 Medical side. Lucy vomited *** bile coloured fluid, she remained sleepy but her temperature settled. Mrs Crawford and Lucy's sister then came into the cubicle. This was approximately 2245 hours and after this point I had no direct contact with Lucy. After this time I attended to the other patients on the ward. At approximately 2.45 am I was attending another patient with S/N McManus when Sr Edmundson came onto the ward and came to speak to us in the sideroom. McCaffrey came and told us Lucy had a large bowel motion, S/N McManus, Sr Edmundson and E/N McCaffrey went to assist Lucy and her mother. Lucy was then moved into a side room. At approximately 2.50 am I was still in sideroom when E/N McCaffrey called for help. S/N McManus and S/N Jones went to her assistance. The patient I was with settled so I came out to attend to the other patients. I seen the emergency trolley being pushed down the ward so I followed. As I reached the door of the sideroom Mrs Crawford asked me to phone her husband which I did. I let Mr Crawford and his daughter into the ward. Sr Edmundson also entered the ward and attended the Crawford family. Lucy's sister phoned and later Lucy's grandparents came to the ward. In the meantime I continued to attend the other patients. Lucy's sister felt faint and I took her to the day room and I gave her a glass of water and sat her down by the window. Her grandparents were in attendance. At this point I continued to attend the rest of the ward.

Mr Murnaghan:

The admission assessment was done by Nurse McDowell and Dr Malik. I was involved with Dr Malik in the treatment room. He had difficulty obtaining a vein – he tried once unsuccessfully. I assumed he had made up to three attempts as he contacted Dr O'Donohue, I cannot recall how long he took to arrive. I was present when Dr O'Donohue inserted the needle – Dr Malik was present then. Dr O'Donohue was in charge he was responsible for prescribing fluid. Dr Malik was responsible for recording it and I saw him with the fluid balance chart. I now know the chart does not refer to the rate or that it was to be run until urine was passed. At that time it was unusual for the rate not to be written down. I do not know why it was not recorded. I signed the chart prior to the IV fluid being put up. I was not present at the attempted resuscitation of Lucy.

Mr Good:

I did not speak to anyone in the ward about my personal life and I recall no such conversation with Dr Malik. I cannot recall speaking to Mrs Crawford about paracetamol, I did not say to her that the lab was closed – if it is someone is on call. I did not leave the room whilst Dr Malik was attempting access to the vein. The nursing staff were very badly affected by Lucy's death.
