I was called to see Lucy on the day of admission by the SHO on duty (Dr Matik) because he was unable to see a drip. Lucy had been admitted with a history of vomiting and drowniness. On examination she was sleepy but rounsble. Since blood had been sent for ures and electrolyte measurements. I applied local amenthatic cream to the areas where I thought I was most likely to be able to insert an IV cannals. In the magnitude I gave her a buttle of fluid which she took wall.

When the local amountain events had had time to take affect I insured a cansula. While strapping the cansula in situ I saw Dr Mailk writing as I was describing the fluid regime in. 100 mis as a boing over the first hour and them 30 rais per hour. The 100 mis was approximately 10 mi/Kg and to cover the possibility that the cannula might not last very long and the succeeding rate was relatively slow since I had seen but taking oral fluid well and premuned the rate of fluid need was relatively small. The intraveness fluid used was saline 0.13% suline;

I looked into the treatment room a few minutes later and Lucy was standing on the couch in fract of her mother and looking better.

I was next called at approximately 03,00 because Lucy had had what sounded like a convaluous. My initial presumption was that this was a fibrile convaluous. However since the showed no signs of recovering by the time I arrived and since there was a history of profises distribute I took a specimen for repent were and electrolytes. My recollection is that Dr Malik had started the inequenous normal saline before calling me and that the 500 rule given was virtually complete before I arrived. Her repent were and electrolytes measurement showed the sodium had fallon to 127. When I took over bugging from Dr Mulik it was clear that there was no respiratory effort and her pupils were fixed and dilated. I continued bagging until Dr Amerson (smeathetist) arrived and he intubated her and the was transferred to ECU.

I arranged transfer to the Peedistric Intensive Care Unit in the Royal Belfast Hospital the Sick.
Children and since there was no ensenthetist to wavel with her I accompanied. I was unable to make a diagnosis for her deterioration prior to transfer. She was head begged until arrival in Belfast either by myself or the accompanying mure from ICU. The only problem in transit was a fall in her blood pressure towards the endo of the journey at which point I started a departies infinion.
