

RE: INQUIRY INTO HYPONATRAEMIA RELATED DEATHS- CLAIRE ROBERTS

I refer to the above matter and to your letter dated 1st June 2012, reference as quoted above.

We have previously informed the Inquiry Legal Team in our letters dated 28th September 2011 (no reference) and 15th November 2011 (reference BPC-0089-11), that the Trust's practice at that time in relation to the disposal of records, depended on whatever local practice was in existence at the relevant time, and that storage space was a major factor in deciding which documents to retain.

Also, prior to the DHSSPS Guidance "Good Management Good Records" (December 2004) and the Belfast Trust Retention and Disposal Schedule (March 2008), there was no written policy in place in the former Royal Hospitals Trust for the disposal of documentation, including ward diaries.

In her statement, Ms Pollock has stated that the ward diary would now be destroyed or disposed of under current policy. I confirm that, for these reasons, the Belfast Trust has no record of the current whereabouts of the diary, nor if and when it has been disposed of or archived.

This concludes my client's response to your above-mentioned letter.
