

## RE: INQUIRY INTO HYPONATRAEMIA RELATED DEATHS - RAYCHEL FERGUSON GOVERNANCE

I refer to the above matter and to your letter dated 7<sup>th</sup> May 2013 (reference as quoted above) and confirm we have received our client's instructions.

The autopsy report on page 6 (062-048-119) lists the sites which were swabbed as 'lungs, trachea, liver, faeces, sputum and intestine'. With regard to the specimens for microbiology which are listed in your letter, by a process of elimination it is possible that specimen 607501 is sputum. If this is the case, this would have been taken directly from the trachea either by scraping a small sample of liquid sputum into a sterile container or by taking a swab from the inside of the trachea. It is not possible to determine from the report which specimen was submitted for microbiology (looking for bacterial organisms) and which for virology (looking for viruses). However, tissue for viral studies has to be 'wet' tissue but bacteriological studies are undertaken on swab samples it is therefore entirely possible that a swab from the trachea was taken to exclude bacterial infection and a 'wet' sample of the sputum taken from the same site for viral studies.

In your letter you ask for a copy of the relevant entry in the 'mortuary log book'. We would be grateful if you could clarify what it is you mean by 'mortuary log book'.
