- GAIN by including NPSA guidance on children even if at Departments request are endorsing the content
- NPSA alert 22 is listed in the references in the report CG84 by NICE. It should not be in conflict with NI guidance or wall chart.

I would advise:

- clarifying with Prof M Shields/responees what is the specific conflict with the NPSA guidance and the wall chart. Response should be requested for consideration on my return from leave on 17 August 2009
- informing GAIN of the concern raised pending the publication of the fluid guidelines for adults and children

Clarification should allow us to consider if the issue needs raised with NICE/NPSA/GAIN or that the NICE guidance CG84 be issued.

I have considered the comments and the NICE guidance. I have also discussed the matter with Dr Livingston.

I advise writing to GAIN to ensure that the updated guidance on fluid management to prevent hyponatraemia reflects the NICE guidance on Diarrhoea and vomiting in children CG84.

I would suggest inclusion of the following in the request:

The Department has not yet formally endorsed the Nice Guidance CG84 Diarrhoea and vomiting in children. Clinicians have raised a number of issues regarding its potential conflict with the GAIN guidelines on Hyponatraemia. We are grateful for the work you have done in developing the guidance but would ask you to ensure that your updated version reflects the Nice Guidance , appreciating that it is a subset of the group to which your guidance applies.

The Department have not formally adopted the NICE guidance CG84 until your clarification is sought. We would appreciate your response by **11 September 2009**.

Martin,

Last Friday I briefly mentioned that I would be asking for your advice regarding the application in NI of the NICE clinical guideline on the management of acute diarrhoea and vomiting in children under 5 years. The guidance provides recommendations for fluid management which covers various scenarios including children with clinical dehydration (including hyponatraemic dehydration).

You will see below comments from Professor Mike Shields and also some members of the paediatric regional IV Fluid working group in which they appear to agree with some aspects of the NICE guidance and not with others. They suggest amending the NICE guidance to reflect local strategy however as you will be aware we are unable to change NICE guidance.

Due to the pending Hyponatraemia inquiry and the nature of this guidance I would be extremely grateful for your advice on this matter. Is there a particular person in the Department who you feel we should contact for further comment, should we proceed with the CMO submission for endorsement and include a caveat to the endorsement circular advising of the local strategy/guidance/wallcharts or is there another course of action you would suggest?

We have not forward local expert comments to the NI Guidance Review Group as yet as I am unsure what further comments we may need to seek therefore there will be a slight delay to our normal local review process.

We feel that this document has many good points but also disagree with some.

Most importantly, we believe that it should mirror the IV Fluids guidelines that we have – which it does not in its current form

The Group (under the leadership of Dr Jarlath McAloon, email: Jarlath.McAloon@northerntrust.hscni.net) would be happy to use this NICE document and modify it so that it is brought in line with our strategy and is acceptable. We will therefore await instruction from the NICE Guidance DHSSNI

Below are some unattributed comments

This document looks like it was created by a committee that never met.

Very piecemeal and does not pull together.

I wholeheartedly agree with the comments by Jarlath and Patrick

Now for specifics

P 4,5 - like the key priorities but as others have said the IV fluid instructions are inconsistent with the guideline P 6 - diagnosis is reasonable but in other NICE documents there is a clear linking algorithm regarding what should be done by telephone, GP or paediatric specialist.

P 7 - I agree that sometimes we should do biochemistry tests even if no IV is contemplated or no signs of hypernatremia (once you have these signs you are in trouble!) P 9 - fluid management should be similar to our guide (although there is not much about ORS in it) P 10-11 - good emphasis on fluid management/nutrition after rehydration P 12 just does not make sense - a nice algorithm here would work P 13 - good to emphasize no anti diarrhoeals - but antibiotics should only be considered in secondary care - and this is not clear.

P 14 - advice for parents good

Such a shame. It could have been a very useful document but as written it will be thrown on a pile and never read.

I think there is a lot that is useful; some content that is potentially confusing and some points I disagree with.

a. Good:

Preamble, introduction, clinical assessment, nutrition advice, antibiotics & antidiarrhoeals, advice for parents

b. Potentially confusing

1. key diagnosis priority for suspected septicemic patient = stools culture. The emphasis that the patient should be in secondary care at this point seems lost 2. the key priority advice list in respect of fluid management for clinical dehydration is insufficiently clear that the reference is to ORS and not IV (p4, short reference guide) 3. The advice on IV replacement is loose and potentially conflicts with our local guideline 4. The monitoring advice is too loose

c. Disagree.

1. I don't agree with giving a dehydrated patient water (until they have become a hydrated, normonatremic patient that is).

2. I disagree on the point that a clinically dehydrated patient does not routinely need a U&E unless being given IV fluids 3. I don't like the calculation method or loose timing for correction of deficits for IV treatment as it runs the risk of over treatment

Opinion (for what its worth).

I think this document could cause confusion if adopted without changes. The advice on IV fluid treatment should first be changed to completely complement our Regional IV therapy Guideline.
